Interview with **Rezarta Kapaj, MD** National Secretary, Albania


Recently published in Aesthetic Plastic Surgery...

Tuberous Breast, Deformities, and Asymmetries: A Retrospective Analysis Comparing Fat Grafting Versus Mastopexy and Breast Implants

The tuberous breast is considered a breast deformity characterized by varying degrees of herniation of the parenchyma, widened nipple-areolar complex (NAC), absence of the lower quadrants, and may involve several degrees of hypoplasia and asymmetry causing significant psychosocial distress.

The paper aimed to compare the results obtained in patients suffering tuberous breast treated with fat grafting (FG), with those of patients treated with a mastopexy and silicone implants (M-SI) also analyzing the influence of breast and chest deformities (degrees of hypoplasia and tuberous breast, volume and NAC asymmetry, pectus excavatum, and carinatum) in the reconstructive outcomes.

MONTHLY EDUCATION CORNER

What About Pre- and Post-Op Pictures in Social Media?



During the past Congress in Athens, we presented several sessions on business development in cosmetic surgery; here, you will have the opportunity to approach the topic, "The Ethical Challenge in Social Media for Physicians: Balancing Promotion and Responsibility," presented by Dr. Sixtus Allert.

In the digital era, social media has become an indispensable tool for promoting and sharing our work, providing medical professionals with a unique platform to inform, educate, and advertise. However, this communication revolution has also transformed the traditional roles of us physicians, who must now take on entrepreneurial and business roles to stand out in the competitive world.

As physicians engage with social media, a significant challenge arises, which is the difficulty patients face in recognizing our roles. **Are we merely doctors or businessmen?** Confusion mounts when observing the growing trend among many physicians to blend entertainment with their posts, showcasing dance routines and humorous moments that could undermine professionalism.

The search for pre-and post-operative images by patients is increasingly common. However, the line

between **educational promotion and unnecessary exhibition** becomes blurry when some physicians become influencers. The need to differentiate from this trend is vital to preserve professional integrity.

In some countries, there are regulations to prevent damage to the specialty's reputation and the physicians' credibility. **Responsible publishing becomes imperative**, and understanding what and how to post becomes crucial to maintaining a reputation.

In the process of educating patients, it has become common to post before-and-after photos of surgeries, but concern lies in the negative influence this may have on young individuals. The seriousness of content and responsibility in publication becomes essential, as it is not merely about the number of followers but about safety and trust.

Ethics in publishing plastic surgery images is a **delicate matter**. Some countries have codes of conduct regulating the use of before-and-after images. Failure to comply with these rules in the United States can lead to restrictions, prohibitions, and sanctions. Discussions in national societies emphasize the importance of setting limits on plastic surgeons' commercial use of social media.

The manipulation of images that do not reflect medical reality raises another ethical concern. Defining the postoperative time of photos and showcasing not only recent but also long-term results becomes a necessity. Additionally, using models in photographs and distinguishing between social media images and genuine medical photographs pose additional challenges.

The question arises about assessing the reliability of medical accounts and websites. Should there be an approval seal from medical societies to distinguish the most reliable professionals? However, the lack of global standards hinders the implementation of these criteria, as each country has its own rules.

Ultimately, finding a balance between promoting medical work on social media and moral responsibility remains a continuous challenge for healthcare professionals. The key lies in awareness of our role as educators, understanding our ethical responsibilities, and adopting practices that preserve the integrity of the medical profession in an increasingly digital world.


