

ISAPS: First, congratulations on being nominated ISAPS: What do you consider necessary for the for National Secretary Chair. How did it come to fruition, and what work did it require?

LI: It's a very interesting history for me; I recently reviewed my files and found a letter from 2009 from an ISAPS teaching course in Beijing.

I had just graduated from a leading university, Peking Union Medical College, where I got my MD and PhD. That year, I received an invitation to an ISAPS teaching course, but I was so busy and unable to attend. But I recall ISAPS members visiting Beijing. I feel so lucky because, after all this time of knowing about ISAPS, I am now a National Secretary and can serve this great organization.

ISAPS: What does it mean for you to be elected as ISAPS National Secretary, and how do you see your role's impact in helping others get more engaged?

LI: The National Secretary is a significant position for me, as it allows me to serve all the doctors, have them communicate with me, and be able to reach surgeons outside of our country. I view my position as a crosspoint for this exchange of information.

success of aesthetic plastic surgery?

LI: I have a very good sense of beauty, with Plastic Surgery as my major; 10 years ago, I started to focus on aesthetic surgery, and eight years ago, I joined ISAPS. For continued success in our specialty, we must first be 'the thinkers'; aesthetic plastic surgery is more than just a cultural perception, and we must communicate with each other to learn as much as we can. For example, when considering human tissue in surgery, there are many techniques and ways to modify different types of tissues. I think we are still at the very beginning of aesthetic medicine.

With so much still to learn, this is one of the reasons why communicating frequently is so important. That is why I am happy about the National Secretary position; it's not only about accepting this role but also having the responsibility to get more opportunities to communicate regularly.

ISAPS: What is on your agenda as National Secretary?

LI: I hope we can entice local plastic surgeons to join ISAPS at the beginning of the year. To facilitate this, I am working with the Education Council Chairs and hope to

get ISAPS faculty to join local meetings and present. and hopefully get more people to join based on this I hope to have a combination of lectures, discussions, live surgeries, and cadaver courses, providing local Chinese plastic surgeons with new concepts. And I also want to encourage Chinese doctors to attend the ISAPS Olympiad World Congress in Singapore.

ISAPS: What does ISAPS represent to you?

LI: When I attended the meeting in Cartagena, even though I had never visited South America, it felt like I was coming home since we all have a shared aesthetic plastic education background, which makes it feel like we are all family.

What means a lot to me is the emphasis ISAPS places on patient safety, a fundamental principle for our specialty, and being able to deliver the importance of this locally notion. I also want to engage current members with interactive online educational opportunities. Patient education is critical, but even more so is education among surgeons. ISAPS is known among doctors, but it should also be familiar to patients. If the public sees ISAPS as the great organization it is, we will gain public awareness and recognition.

ISAPS: Will you be attending the ISAPS Olympiad World Congress in Singapore? What does the city represent to you?

LI: Yes, I will! I look forward to it. Singapore is actually very similar to the position of the National Secretaries, as it serves as a crosspoint between East and West and is also a wonderful vacation spot.

Patient Safety Advisory—Breast Implant Removal and Capsulectomy

There has been a worldwide increase in the number of patients requesting implant removal for a variety of systemic symptoms that they attribute to their implants. This has been referred to as silicone incompatibility syndrome (SIS), autoimmune/inflammatory syndrome induced by adjuvants (ASIA), and breast implant illness (BII)[1] In the USA, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has included systemic symptoms in a box warning that is required for all implants sold in the US which states, "Patients receiving breast implants have reported a variety of systemic symptoms such as joint pain, muscle aches, confusion, chronic fatigue, autoimmune diseases, and others. Individual patient risk for the development of these symptoms has not been well established.

What We Know


- Systemic symptoms patients attribute to their breast implants have been reported with all types of implants: saline and gel filled, smooth and textured surfaces, and has been reported with implants from every manufacturer.
- Over 100 symptoms have been reported, in no specific configuration.
- Some patients will experience symptom improvement with implant removal.

Chapter: Upper Blepharoplasty

Upper blepharoplasty is one of the most commonly performed aesthetic facial surgical procedures. It is performed for both functional and cosmetic reasons. Redundancy of upper eyelid skin can result in compromise of peripheral visual field, particularly on upward and outward gaze.

Upper blepharoplasty can result in improvement of peripheral visual field. When there is redundancy of upper eyelid skin, the patients tend to raise their eyebrows to compensate for the redundancy and this results in a constantly surprised look. Furthermore, it results in transverse wrinkling of the forehead.

The Art of Storytelling: The Key to Successful Plastic Surgeons

I recall my early years as a doctor with a mix of nostalgia and some embarrassment. My head was full of knowledge, my hands were agile, and my heart was willing to heal, but when it came to communicating with my patients ... I was a disaster!

I used a lot of medical jargon and explained technical details during consultations, which ended up confusing my patients or, worse, scaring them. I spoke much more than they did, thinking I was giving them the most complete and accurate information. When I started to venture into the digital world, my emails were cold and technical, and my social media posts seemed to be taken from a textbook. I couldn't connect, and that frustrated me enormously.

One day, after a long explanation of a patient's diagnosis, with great detail and statistics, I felt that my patient had not understood anything; their face said it all. This happened frequently; everything I explained had to be repeated; it was an absolute waste of time. Even worse, on one occasion, a patient told me, "Doctor," she said with a trembling voice, "I didn't understand anything. I just want to know if I'm going to be okay after my surgery." I realized that, in my eagerness to demonstrate knowledge, I had forgotten the most important thing: **the "human being" behind my patient**.

To further emphasize this disengagement, of the 10 patients I would consult, only three underwent surgery. My patients didn't need a masterclass; they needed **empathy, clarity, and hope**. I needed to improve my efficiency in the consultation.

From that moment on, I decided to change. I started to research and explore communication techniques, read about persuasion and effective communication methods, observe and ask for advice from my more experienced colleagues, and look for mentors in related fields. Thus, I discovered the power of **storytelling**.

Instead of overwhelming patients with data about their reason for consultation, I began to use the story of another patient who, by making the right decisions, researching reliable sources, and trusting us, had a successful outcome in their surgery. I always told anecdotes about patients to illustrate better the situation that would arise in the case of the current patient, and so they paid more attention and were more satisfied; they understood better what I wanted to say, and they didn't forget it so quickly.

On my social networks, instead of publishing scientific articles and my participation at congresses, I shared **anecdotes about my patients** (always with their consent and taking care of their privacy), success stories that inspired me, or personal reflections on my path as a doctor. The response was incredible. My **patients felt more understood** and connected with me, and now they make their decisions more easily, and the efficiency of my consultation has increased.

I learned to use metaphors to explain complex concepts, including a touch of humor to relieve tension and end my consultations with a message of encouragement and hope. I discovered that stories not only informed but also generated **trust and engagement**.

A good "story" has four basic components: the protagonist, the conflict, and the way forward, impregnated with emotions. The protagonist in our case is the patient; we must **identify their fears**, **hopes**, **and desires**. The conflict is what they want to resolve; we must ask about their feelings about it, and it is fundamental to elaborate a script. The path is the solution we can offer them, always finding a way to **connect with their feelings**; we must communicate everything constantly, resorting to emotions associated with their desires.

In the competitive world of plastic surgery, standing out and connecting with the audience is essential to **building a strong personal brand** and converting people interested in surgery into patients who decide to undergo surgical procedures. Stories humanize us, make us feel emotions, and connect us with others. They **generate trust and establish a more authentic connection** with your potential patients. They help you differentiate yourself by showing uniqueness and a personal approach. They are an effective way to educate about procedures, techniques, and results while entertaining and keeping the audience engaged. They inspire potential patients and motivate them to make informed decisions.
